A 5 Week Course to Get Started in Oil Painting

Weekly Classes Start Monday September 8, 2025 — 6:30-9:00pm

We will be covering the basics of oil painting in the context of learning the fundamental principles of art. It is my belief that it is by mastering basic principles that an artist becomes capable of creating quality art in any medium. Oil painting offers the widest range of color, value and texture of any painting medium. Oil paintings have a greater perceived value in the market, are easy to frame and are durable as works of art.

The weekly class format was chosen for a number of reasons. I believe it maximizes the in-class contact time. The week between classes will give you time to absorb the content and return the next week better able to go on to the next step. There will be in-class demonstrations, critiques, and examples relating to the lesson. We will paint directly from still life. Class size is limited to 12 students so that you will get the personal attention needed to get the most out of the class.

Jerry's Artarama Introduction to Oil Painting list Here is what is included:

- Oil Paint: Gamblin Artists Oil brand, 37 ml tube Colors: Alizarin Permanent, Ultramarine Blue, India Yellow, Titanium White
- Odorless Mineral Spirits, 16 oz or more
- Canvas Paper Pad 9x12 (with 10 sheets or more) Buy 2 if you know you will be painting outside of class.
- Paper Palette Pad, (for oil painting) 9x12
- Palette Knife for mixing paint (medium sized, triangular trowel shape)
- Stainless steel air tight brush washer or glass jar brush washer
- Hog Bristle Paint Brushes Sizes: #1 round, #2 flat or bright, #6 bright, #10 bright

Additional Paint Colors needed for Alla Prima Oil Painting class

- Cadmium Yellow Light Cadmium Orange
- Cadmium Red Medium Cerulean Blue Hue
- Phthalo Green or Permanent Green (Optional)

What You Need to Find Elsewhere

- Paper Towels
- Masking Tape (I use green 3M tape) Lowes/HomeDepot
- Pencils and note/sketch pad for sketching and taking notes
- Small plastic bags/store bags (to dispose used paper towels and unused paint) These need to go home with you.

Optional

- 9x12 or larger baking pan with cover. You can use something like this to store your wet palette until another painting session.
 You can even freeze oil paint to keep it wet longer.
 Or search "covered oil painting palette" on Amazon.
- Small pliers to open stubborn paint tubes.
- 9x 12 canvas boards instead of the canvas pad from the list above. Hobby Lobby has them in packs of 5
- 20x30 masonite or smooth plywood board (approximate size, used to mount canvas paper while painting)
- Lower cost student grade oil paint: Instead of "Gamblin Artists
 Oil" buy "Gamblin 1980". This is the same company but
 less expensive version. Color names are the same: Alizarin
 Permanent, Ultramarine Blue, India Yellow, Titanium White
- Lower cost brushes. You will have to search. Just make sure they
 are natural bristle (usually hog bristle) same sizes already listed:
 #1 round, #2 flat or bright, #6 bright, #10 bright
